PASTOR'S PARISHABLES

July's Image of Faith of the Good Shepherd is not just any good shepherd. This simple line drawing is taken from an early Christian etching in the catacombs. Including "pan pipes" (commonly used by shepherds among the ancient Greeks, I just learned) to represent the "melodious teaching" of Christ makes it especially unique. And part of Christ's teaching that was especially unique is the parable. And parables are featured 3 Sundays in a row this July (when we read the "parables discourse"—chapter 13 of St. Matthew's gospel).

This Sunday's Weeds in the Wheat parable brought to mind the famous "Bookmark of St. Teresa of Avila":

Nada te turbe. Let nothing disturb you, Nada te espante, Let nothing dismay you,

Todo se pasa, All things pass, Dios no se muda, God never changes, La paciencia Patience attains Todo lo alcanza, All that it strives for.

Quien a Dios tiene Who has God Nada le falta Lacks nothing Sólo Dios basta. God alone suffices.

This poem/prayer is so called because it was found, written in her own hand, in the breviary of the famous

16th century mystic & Carmelite nun.

That was a difficult Scripture last Sunday, one that I've been asked about. This is the text: The disciples approached him & said, "Why do you speak to them in parables?" He said to them in reply, "Because knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven has been granted to you, but to them it has not been granted. To anyone who has, more will be given & he will grow rich; from anyone who has not, even what he has will be taken away. This is why I speak to them in parables, because 'they look but do not see & hear but do not listen or understand.' Isaiah's prophecy is fulfilled in them, which says: 'You shall indeed hear but not understand, you shall indeed look but never see. Gross is the heart of this people, they will hardly hear with their ears, they have closed their eyes lest they see with their eyes & hear with their ears & understand with their heart & be converted, & I heal them' (Matthew 13:10-17). Since we're in a 3-Sunday read-through of Matthew's "parables discourse", it deserves some comment.

I rely on commentaries & footnotes in our Revised New American Bible to understand this myself & explain it to you. (This is not for the faint of heart!) The footnote on that text says, Since a parable is figurative speech that demands reflection for understanding, only those who are prepared to explore its meaning can come to know it. To understand is a gift of God, granted to the disciples but not to the crowds. In Semitic fashion, both the disciples' understanding & the crowd's obtuseness [density??] are

attributed to God. The question of human responsibility for the obtuseness is not dealt with, although it is asserted in v. 13" [which I've underlined above]. "Knowledge of the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven" means recognition that the kingdom has become present in the ministry of Jesus.

The parallel account in Mark's gospel is even worseif I may put it bluntly, but respectfully!: The mystery of the kingdom of God has been granted to you. But to those outside everything comes in parables, so that 'they may look & see but not perceive & hear & listen but not understand, in order that they may not be converted & be forgiven'" (Mark 4:11-12). "So that"?! Saying "because they don't understand" (as Matthew does) is one thing, but to say "so that they may not understand" is another!

The footnote to those verses in Mark says: *These verses* are to be viewed against [the background of] unbelief & opposition Jesus encountered in his ministry. It is against this background that the distinction in Jesus' method becomes clear of presenting the kingdom to the disbelieving crowd in one manner & to the disciples in another. To the former it is presented in parables & the truth remains hidden; for the latter the parable is interpreted & the mystery is partially revealed because of their faith.

Does this help?? For me, only a little. So I went 1 step further: The passage of Isaiah that Jesus quotes is Isaiah 6:9-10 (right after the call of Isaiah, "Whom shall I send?" "Here I am; send me!"). The footnote there says, The truth that the nation will remain impenitent is vividly foretold, as if its obstinacy would be cause, instead of merely occasioned by, the prophet's warning.

It's passages like this (& scholars' explanations) that make Bible study forbidding to some—but at the same time demonstrates its importance & our need of it.

We noticed last week that, among the 17 parishes of the diocese (including Blue Earth) that have already surpassed their goals, 3 of them are way, way over the top—all in a cluster west of us: Jackson, Sherburn, & Lakefield. Part of the reason—only part, I think—is that their pastor makes the point of integrating a significant local project (parking lot repair, for example), part of the annual Catholic ministries appeal. That's a smart (& recommended) practice. If money is needed for something locally anyway, why not make only 1 appeal with 2 purposes ... especially because all money received over & above the diocesan goal is returned to the parish and is not subject to diocesan assessment ("tax free," as we say in the world). This practice is very similar to what all parishes did in a big way in 2013's capital campaign, Seeds of Faith (except then, numbers were much bigger & 1/4 of all money donated, right from the start, was reimbursed to the parish.) Our project was the renovation of the rectory. In the future, remind me to include a local, needed project too, because it will doubly benefit us.
